

- > enhancement and upgrades to our information systems and equipment.


Crime Continues to Trend Down


Preliminary figures on crime reported in 2014 show reductions in most of Danville's serious crime. Most significant is that there were only three homicides last year, down from six the previous year. There were also reductions in the other major crime categories of burglary, larceny, motor vehicle theft and arson. Reported robberies were down by one from the previous year however there were increases in reported aggravated assaults and rapes. The overall total of these reported offenses were down from 2,204 in the previous year to 1,954 in 2014.





2014 Calls for Service



Directed Patrol Techniques

Department-Wide Directed Patrol

brought the implementation 2014 of Department-wide directed patrol techniques. Previously this technique had been successfully used by the Community Police section and on a case-by-case basis by the Patrol Division. using location and time data on reported crimes, proactive patrols are directed into geographic areas with higher probabilities of crime occurrence. The Department continues to work toward using data to more efficiently direct patrol activities, including using DDACTS -Data-Driven Approach to Crime and Traffic Safety - an operational model developed through a partnership between the Department of Justice and the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration. This technique involves the overlay of crime and traffic crash data to help direct resources to have a proactive impact on traffic safety and crime, since vehicle travel is such an integral component of our mobile This process also leverages society. deterrence value of highly visible enforcement actions.




















Drug Arrest Ten Year Trend












Ten Year Warrant Trend

The Danville Police Department handles warrants many ways. Officers obtain warrants for crimes they are assigned to investigate or officers serve warrants obtained by other parties such as private citizens or other law enforcement agencies. The management of these documents falls to the Police Records Division. Once a warrant is obtained, it is entered into the Records Management System(RMS) and is tracked from entry to service. Warrants are also entered into the state and/or national wanted persons data base. Our warrant totals generally average in the thousands and range in subject matter from unpaid parking tickets to homicide. The graph below depicts a ten year trend in warrants handled by the Danville Police Department.

Implementation of Law Enforcement Technology & Equipment

Department-wide deployment of Body-Worn Cameras

Police Department first deployed 10 The Danville enforcement grade body-worn cameras on officers of the Street Crimes Unit in 2011. This was such a success that the following year Department of Justice grant funds were used to purchase 8 additional cameras so that each member of the unit had an individual device. In 2013 the Office of the Attorney General of Virginia accepted grant-style applications from local agencies for a one-time transfer from the Asset Forfeiture Funds related to the Abbott Laboratories plea agreement. Through this program the Department received \$169,593.00 in funds to purchase cameras and related data storage/management services for all sworn members whose daily activities involve enforcement actions. With these funds the Department purchased 96 body worn cameras, related hardware, infrastructure upgrades and 4 years of hosted data storage/management services.












Public Safety Systems Enhancements

In the spring of 2014, the Police Department fully launched our Police 2 Citizen (P2C) site. This internet-based system, which was a part of the public safety system upgrade in 2012, allows the public to easily obtain copies of crash reports and incident reports at no cost, view recent arrests, active warrants, most wanted persons, make inmate inquires for Danville Adult Detention and Danville City Jail, and to submit on-line commendations Department personnel. This site not only saves citizens the time and expense associated with coming down to the Police Department to obtain copies of reports, it saves the time of Records clerks who would have to handle these transactions in person. This initiative was funded with a planned capital improvement project and grant funding.







Public Safety Systems Enhancements



Information Technology Department GIS (Geographical Information System) programmer Tim Shortly worked with the Police Department to create a community crime mapping application that allows citizens to access information about crimes in specific geographical areas of the city. The crime data displayed on this application reflects the eight Part I Offenses defined by the FBI's Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program which include Homicide, Forcible Sex Offense, Robbery, Aggravated Assault, Burglary, Grand Larceny, Motor Vehicle Theft, and Arson and covers the current plus three previous year's data. The information can be view on a police beat or sub-beat level with a color gradient that represents crime frequency in those specific areas. This application was made available in June of 2014 and can be accessed from the Department web or P2C site.





In-Car Video Replacement

<u>In-Car Video Replacement</u>

The Police Department began a complete replacement of our in-car video systems. The old systems had been in service close to 8 years and represented our first step from analog VHS tape to a completely digital format. Audio/video and related technology changed considerably in that span of time and the manufacturer's current version offered many significant improvements. These new systems include high definition (HD) cameras that produce crisp, clear recordings that also perform well in low light conditions. The previous system was configured with a single forward facing camera, so a second camera was added to record the rear prisoner transport compartment area of the vehicle. This provides an added safety measure for officers, as they are able to quickly glance at the in-car laptop screen to see what a prisoner may be doing in the back seat without having to completely turn around. Additionally, the camera documents any actions or statements the arrestee may make while in police custody inside the vehicle as well as his/her outward physical condition.











In-Car Video Replacement

The new wireless microphones now have up to a mile range, compared with the line-of-sight range of the older versions. New features also include an impact/crash sensor that automatically the to triggers system automatically in the event of a collision, back up battery for the recorder in the event of sudden loss of the vehicle's primary power supply, and integrated wireless backhaul of recorded data over Wi-Fi instead of over the vehicle's cellular modem which frees bandwidth to improve the operation of other vehicle-based systems. the Additionally, the old 3G wireless modems were upgraded to LTE 4G versions to take advantage significant infrastructure improvements made by our wireless carrier over the past two years. This initiative was funded with a planned capital improvement project and grant funding.











Interview / Interrogation Room Video Replacement

The Department was also able to leverage the new in-car video system replacement project to upgrade our existing Interview/Interrogation Room recording system. The old system was custom built in-house and recorded directly to a DVD, which then had to be physically stored in our Property and Evidence Vault. The new system's features include the addition of a second camera to cover the entire room, HD quality cameras and an improved microphone that can pick up a whisper. This new system utilizes the same back-end video evidence management system used to store in-car video. The back-end system is the heart of any law enforcement video recording implementation that allows the data to be stored in a secure and fully auditable manner with scheduled retention periods, just the same a physical piece of evidence collected by the Department. This initiative was funded through a federal grant.













Electronic Summons Implementation (E-Tickets)

During the latter part of 2014, the Department made the necessary hardware purchases to implement an electronic summons system that was anticipated as a part of the previous upgrade of our RMS (Records Management System) and Mobile Field Reporting system. Commonly referred to as eSummons eCitation, this system allows for the printing of Virginia Uniform Summonses (traffic tickets) in the mobile environment of a police vehicle. The most significant efficiency of this system is that summons data is transmitted securely into our RMS, then transferred daily to the Virginia Supreme Court where is it available for our local courts. Though initially scheduled for implementation in the previous year, this project was postponed to coincide with the significant vehicle system rework related to the in-car video replacement. This allowed the Department to install hardware for the in-car replacement, modem upgrade and video eSummons printer hardware all at one time, thereby saving on labor costs and vehicle down time.

Electronic Summons Implementation (E-Tickets)

In the fall of 2014 the Department began transmitting eSummons data to the Virginia Supreme Court and later during 2015 we will begin using the printer hardware in the vehicles installation once completed and the system is fully online. The eSummons project will improve efficiency by reducing the time it takes an officer to issue a traffic significantly summons, eliminating reducing or duplicate keying of information into by the **Departments** systems Records Office and court personnel and improve document legibility and accuracy. This initiative was funded with a planned capital improvement project.

Grants for Fiscal Year 2014 / 2015

- Speed Selective Enforcement Grant: \$12,732: Virginia DMV pass through from the U.S. Department of Transportation National Highway Traffic Safety Office for selective enforcement pay and equipment purchase
- Alcohol Selective Enforcement Grant: \$10,781: Virginia DMV pass through from the U.S. Department of Transportation National Highway Traffic Safety Office for selective enforcement pay
- Department of Justice JAG Grant: \$22,213: For mobile forensic solution for advanced extraction, decoding, analysis and reporting of evidentiary data from mobile devices and new mobile applications that will extend core Computer Aided Dispatch and Records Management System functionality to authorized mobile devices used by law enforcement officers in the field.
- Department of Justice Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant: \$28,969.23: The Bulletproof Vest Partnership (BVP), created by the Bulletproof Vest Partnership Grant Act of 1998 is a unique U.S. Department of Justice initiative designed to provide a critical resource to state and local law enforcement. This grant provides funds to pay for 50% of the cost of body armor for Danville Police Officers.




