Feel the rush of a prison break as Terry Brooks drops you directly into the calamity as eight teens scatter to break free in *Child of Light*. The story focuses on Auris Afton Grieg's escape to freedom leaving behind the goblin confines she's known most of her life. While on the run,

Auris is separated from her friends but meets Harrow, a fae warrior who strongly believes Auris is fae too, even though she looks human. Trusting in his belief, Harrow whisks Auris away to the fae territories, a haven from the goblins.

This was my first fantasy read, and I can tell you it opened my eyes to a whole new genre. I love the magical elements and the subtle love story, which does not overshadow the action but instead, adds to the significance of the characters' choices. I have yet to find another book where I love the fae's abilities as much as in *Child of Light*.

from the Danville/Pittsylvania County region of Virginia as a part of the Reflections of Home Arts Festival.





Happy Land Written by Dolen Perkins-Valdez Narrated by Bahni Tupin

The audiobook version of *Happy Land* by Dolen Perkins-Valdez is narrated by the award winning actress Bahni Turpin and available on Libby. Together, the author and narrator bring to life the "Kingdom of the Happy



Land", a settlement founded in 1865 by formerly enslaved families in Western North Carolina.

Founders William and Luella Montgomery were named "King and Queen", and were able to purchase 210 acres at a little less than \$1 an acre from the family of Serepta Merritt Davis, widow of a plantation owner. For several decades, the kingdom thrived. Through shared labor and an "all for one, one for all" ethos, they built a self-sufficient community. Together, they raised crops, educated their children and sold medicinal cures, most notably "Happy Land Liniment," a popular remedy made from plants and herbs.






Mistborn: The Well of

LET'S LEARN ABOUT JUNETEENTH



Juneteenth is the oldest known celebration honoring the official end of slavery in the United States. The Emancipation Proclamation, by executive federal order, proclaimed that all slaves were free, in 1863. But, the Civil War had not ended and rebel states, such as Texas, refused to obey the order. It was on June 19, 1865, when General Gordon Granger led thousands of federal troops into Galveston, Texas announcing that all those enslaved had been freed. By withholding this information, powerful slaveholders had condemned enslaved people to two additional years of confinement.

June nineteenth, the date of Granger's arrival became the target date for Juneteenth celebrations in Galveston, soon spreading to African American communities throughout the state and eventually the nation. In 1980, Emancipation Day, recognizing Juneteenth, became a legal holiday in Texas. Festivities are now held nationwide on or near the June nineteenth date. Some also refer to this day of remembrance as Freedom Day, Emancipation Day, or African-American Independence Day.
